Saint Project -- Choosing a Confirmation Name

Scripturally, a name is not only what a person is called, but also who the person is – a special meaning of that person. In Semitic thought, the name conveyed the truth of the person. God was YHWH ("I AM; I AM HERE"); Jesus was Yeshua, Joshua ("One who saves").

Your first name(s) - is the name chosen by your parents when you were born and announced at your Baptism. Your last name – This is the name that was chosen before you were born. This is your family name and is part of your legal name, unless you choose to change it legally (for example when a woman gets married she may choose to take her husband's last name).

Your Confirmation name - This is the name you choose for yourself; although it is not required that you do so. You may choose to reaffirm the same name given to you by your parents at your Baptism. Your Confirmation name does not change your legal name, but is recorded in Church records. In the Scriptures and in Christian history, changing your name signaled a change in your vocation or even your identity. If you choose to take a new name, you will select a name of a Saint. The Saint should be someone whose life or death inspires you or who exhibited qualities you admire. This may take some research and reading, but you are surely find one that is meaningful to you.

- Grades 3 & 4 paragraph should include 5 sentences.
- Grades 5 & 6 should include 3 paragraphs (intro, body, conclusion).
- Grades 7-10 should include 5 paragraphs.

Other ideas: Prepare a PowerPoint slide presentation of at least 8 slides in length; Create a poster with details from your research and an image of your saint; Create a video presentation in which you deliver an oral presentation (2-5 minutes) about your Saint.
